#### **Life-Changing Yoga**

We all hear that physical activity is beneficial to our health, but statistics show that the majority of us are not active. I have tried to make physical activity an important part of my life, in part to overcome the health deficiencies that could impact my daily life.

As covered in my November article, I was born with severe allergies and asthma that impacted my early life, both physically and mentally (bullying). When I moved away from home to Des Moines, I was determined to improve my physical well-being by running. I had a rescue inhaler which I used before heading out to help me breathe and to prevent an exercised-induced asthma attack. When I first started running, I could only go for less than a mile, but over the years, I was able to increase the distance and even carried weights with me to build full body strength.



I eventually had to give up running and other workouts due to spinal issues; that is when I found yoga. To say that yoga was life-changing is an understatement. What I found was a supportive community that offered physical and mental health. I started with the basic Power 1 class where beginners (and some who just like the ease of this class) learn the basics of yoga poses along with some challenges (typical of most classes) that push you to work toward that next level of strength, flexibility, and balance.



After over four years and 1,500 classes, I can see the significant improvement in my quality of life. I see yogis of all ages who may not be able to do all the poses, but they show up because they are also witnessing the life-changing benefits. As we age, balance can become a challenge as we lose muscle mass; yoga can slow or reverse that by building core strength, ultimately providing a better quality of life.

Whether you are physically active or not, I encourage you to try some basic yoga classes. Start slow and keep going because the benefits will take time.

Unsung and Unnamed Heroes:
Of Train Brakes, Chicken Wings,
and Pepper

There are lots of well-known heroes in history, and we rightly celebrate their courage and accomplishments; often the latter is a product, at least in part, of the former. But there are people who have courageously accomplished meaningfully, but have not been identified and celebrated for their accomplishments.

Lately, I've been thinking about unsung, unnamed heroes – three of them.

The first I'll mention is the inventor of hydraulic brakes for train engines. Whoever he was, he came up with the first design for hydraulic brakes and presented the concept to a railroad company, only to be rejected because of safety concerns -- if the hydraulics were to fail, there would be no way to stop the train. A runaway train is an obvious danger, and the proposal was rightly rejected. But he didn't give up. The use of hydraulics was good in concept, so he made one, significant change in the proposal. He proposed that the power of hydraulics be used to keep the brakes from engaging; in order to apply the brakes, the train engineer simply had to release the hydraulics gradually or quickly, depending on how urgently the engineer needed to stop the train. If the hydraulics were to fail for any reason, the brakes would, by default, engage, and the train would come to a screeching halt. Westinghouse patented the revised proposal, but the engineer/designer who came up with the revised proposal remains unknown and unnamed. His recognition of the value of hydraulics, and his willingness to rethink the design, distinguishes him without so much as a mention in our history books. He figured out how to use hydraulics and avoid runaway trains. The design is still used today in trains and also on many large capacity vehicles like trucks and buses.

The second I'll mention has to do with chicken wings. Chicken wings? Yes. There was a day when chicken wings were not popular parts of a dead chicken. You'd get them if you bought a "whole chicken," but they were hardly considered the best part of your purchase; you could boil them for chicken broth after the whole chicken had been roasted and they were part of the leftovers, but that was about it. And how many folks make their own chicken broth — not many, so there was certainly not much of a market for just chicken wings. Chicken breasts, chicken thighs, and drumsticks, yes. Chicken wings, no. But sometime, in a chicken production facility somewhere, there had to have



been a guy in marketing who figured out that chicken wings are delicious when deep fat fried and combined with a variety of rubs and sauces. They have become a staple among "bar foods"; more than 4,000 pounds of wings are sold *daily* in the United States. In 2019, that translated into one billion servings of wings in a single year according to the National Purchase Diary. That person in marketing remains unsung and unnamed, but I love chicken wings, and he's one of my heroes.

The third I'll mention has to do with pepper. Yes, pepper. Imagine, if you will, a spice salesman back in the day. His boss calls him in – maybe because he was new and the one lowest in seniority among the spice salespeople. The boss says that there's a new spice he wants the guy to market; it's black like dirt and has no known nutritional value. But, there's lots of it available and the boss wants to find a market. So, what does the guy do? He designs his marketing plan to tie pepper to salt, the latter being something everyone needs and likes. He made it a matter of good manners that, if someone asks for the salt to be passed, it would be considered impolite not to pass pepper along with the salt. I was eating at a favorite chicken wings place recently, and a somewhat lowlife couple was seated at an adjoining table, and one of the couple asked the other to pass the salt. Both salt AND pepper were passed. Now THAT is the product of effective salesmanship. I don't know how, when, where, or who did it, but the fact is that pepper really has no culinary connection to salt. To this day, however, proper etiquette includes passing a dirt-like spice with salt when only salt is requested.

I mention these three examples to make the point that accomplishments and one's worthwhile contribution to society are not measured by our failures, our challenges, or



societal recognition, but by our resilience. The Bible identifies nine fruits of the spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. I posit a tenth: **tenacity** -tenacity to accomplish a worthy goal with or without recognition or acclaim.

# In The Kitchen with Brian Carlson

This Month's Recipe:

### CHICKEN AND PINTO BEAN STEW

Packed with protein, this easy-to-throw-together stew is perfect for those cold, snowy days — it's comforting and it won't ruin your health goals for the new year. Feel free to use any kind of bean you enjoy. I used pintos here, but great northern, cannellini, and kidneys will work. Serve with crusty whole grain bread and a tossed green salad.

#### **Chicken and Pinto Bean Stew**

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cooked and sliced thin

2 14.5 oz. cans diced tomatoes

2 16 oz. cans pinto beans, drained and rinsed

2 cups low sodium chicken broth

2 tbs extra virgin olive oil

4 cloves garlic, finely minced

1/2 medium onion, finely diced

1/2 tsp dried thyme leaves

1/2 tsp dried parsley

1 sprig fresh rosemary

Salt and pepper to taste



#### **Directions**

1. In 4-quart pot, cook the garlic and onion in olive oil over medium heat until just translucent. Add thyme and parley and mix well. Stir in broth and tomatoes. Increase heat to medium-high and bring to simmer.

2. Reduce heat to medium-low. Add chicken breast and beans and stir to incorporate. Add rosemary sprig. Let simmer until hot and flavors meld. Add salt and pepper to desired taste. Ladle stew into bowls. (Serves 4)






#### Loren Olson

Dr. Olson counseled his friends for years before realizing that it was possible to make a living practicing psychiatry. #### A Visit from the Bishop

The Most Rev. William M. Joensen, Ph.D. Bishop for the Des Moines Archdiocese, was the speaker for First Friday Breakfast Club this morning at Hoyt Sherman Place. The art galleries, where our gatherings are held, were decked out in their Christmas finery. For the December meeting of the First Friday Breakfast Club, members got to hear the Most Rev. William M. Joensen, Ph.D. Born in Waterloo and the eldest of five children, the most Rev. Joensen grew up in Ames where his father taught. Although his father has passed, his mother still resides in Ames. A good deal of his pastoral history is in Dubuque, Iowa's stronghold of the Catholic faith along the banks of the Mississippi River (where I was also raised). Besides his seminary training, the Bishop holds a doctorate in philosophy. He was installed as the 10th Bishop of the Des Moines Archdiocese in 2019.

The Most Rev. Bishop handed out a few pages containing paragraphs from Pope Francis' letter, "Fratelli Tutti, On Fraternity and Social Friendship" of 3 October 2020 as well as quotations from other philosophers. I am lucky to have those few pages for I fear, like in college, philosophy was not my strong point. It was the only course I ever dropped even though the professor said I was one of the few who grasped what he was lecturing on. I must confess, the Bishop's academic discussion of the need to force ourselves to communicate our "mystery of authentic human existence" left me a little underwhelmed with support. Although his presentation was thoughtful, and not meant to offend, it seemed to fall short for me. There is no doubt the Bishop was walking and talking a fine line as he navigated what must be a different and difficult audience. He seemed more relaxed when answering a few politely asked questions. What still remains in my mind is that **Dignity**, a group that existed in Des Moines in the middle 70s, today has no such existence in Des Moines. Most of those church officials who tried to minister to gay Catholics were either silenced or forced to leave the religious order in which they had been a part. Although mentioning Dignity, the Bishop noted there was no Dignity group in Des Moines, and there was a pastoral need. https://www.dignityusa.org/history

#### **A Hidden Crisis**



Recently, I had the opportunity to sit down with two parents who lost their son to a fentanyl-laced Percocet. Beyond the normal tragic emotions that were shared, the child's parents wanted me to know: #1: his kid was not addict, and #2: he did not overdose—he took a Percocet that he believed was a clean pill but was laced with fentanyl that killed him. He did not overdose. The hidden crisis in our community is that kids buying street drugs do not recognize that the poisons they are using can end up costing them their lives. This leaves more grieving shattered families who are left to pick up the pieces of their lives without the child that they loved.

The chart below outlines the growing trend of fentanyl and fentanyl synthetics on deaths certificates in Polk County.



In January 2021, according to the CDC, drug overdose deaths were up 30% year over year. More than 400 lowans died last year from drug overdoses, with Polk County accounting for 136 of them. In 70% of national overdose drug deaths, opioids were identified as the primary cause of death. Recently, a settlement with opioid producers was announced, and lowa's share of that settlement is about \$170 million. The three distributors will collectively pay up to \$21 billion over 18 years.

President Biden has a new plan to counter this national healthcare crisis. Secretary of Health & Human Services, Xavier Becerra, has rolled out a four-part plan that includes measures to prevent drug addiction by cracking down on inappropriate prescribing of opioids, including federal support for distribution of clean syringes and test strips to identify hidden fentanyl in street drugs. The Administration's policy is to treat addicts less like criminals and more like people in need of treatment. Biden's plan also includes greater access to drug treatment, accompanied by a request for \$11.2 billion to counter the opioid crisis to pay for treatment, pending congressional approval. Regardless of your stance on the impact that opioids have had in America, we simply cannot ignore the fact that a 30% increase represents more than 30,000 new lives lost to drug overdoses.

Polk County is working through our Department of Public Health to prepare for additional treatment for individuals addicted to opioids, and the county intends to use the opioid settlement money for treatment. We intend to also publicly message that with fentanyl, it is a fine line between high and dead. If you play with fentanyl, you're playing a loaded Russian roulette. It would just be a matter of time.

In addition, knowing that there are other gateway drugs that lead to this, Polk County is actively exploring the creation of a sobering center which will allow individuals to begin the process of drying out in a medical environment versus a county jail. We think this would be a good start to addressing addiction.



# The Matrix Resurrections A Movie Review by Mark Turnage

When a new sequel in a high-profile film franchise is announced, it can be challenging to balance audience expectations with narrative predictability in comparison to the new movie's predecessors. Picture a kind of uncanny valley: expecting enough familiarity to connect the current film to its prequels, but also having enough unpredictability to take us by surprise. With 1999's *The Matrix*, a combination of cyberpunk aesthetics, philosophical dialogues, and mind-bending action cinematography spawned four Academy Awards for technical achievements, two additional sequels, and a fashion moment for leather, PVC, and

tiny sunglasses. After its directors Lana and Lily Wachowski both came out as transgender, the film series gained new context as an analogue for transitioning. The fourth *Matrix* is helmed solo by Lana Wachowski and is a more explicitly queer piece of sci-fi cinema, an achievement in itself. *The Matrix Resurrections'* meta-satirical plot has an abundance of queer representation, self-aware insights, and philosophical duels, but too often ends up slowing the story's pace to "bullet time" by rehashing previous installments and cutting back on the trippy action and sci-fi intrigue that made the earlier entries in the franchise so engaging with their audiences.

It goes without saying that as the fourth film in the series, the plot won't make much sense without some familiarity with the first three movies, but for the accessibility of this review, I won't be delving into the plot too deeply, and will instead focus on the general plot structure and queer themes present in *Resurrections* and how they are executed. The central mystery is how Thomas Anderson (Keanu Reeves), a.k.a. Neo, a.k.a. superpowered savior of humanity in a war against sentient machines, wound up living a normal but lonely life as a successful videogame designer. Thomas suspects he is the unwitting prisoner of a new *Matrix*, a lifelike computer simulation masterminded by villainous machine programs (that look human) with a chip on their shoulder against humanity. He also thinks this sounds crazy and is prescribed "blue pills" by his therapist (Neal Patrick Harris). His partner and love interest Trinity (Carrie-Ann Moss) doesn't recognize him and has traded in her vinyl suit (but not the Ducati motorcycle) for her new life as Tiffany, a married mother of two. The audience is aware that they both *must* be stuck in the Matrix, and both Thomas and Tiffany suspect something is off with their lives. But it isn't until an intrepid team from "the real world" led by Bugs (Jessica Henwick) discovers him that Thomas starts to piece together who he really is ... and resurrect a nemesis who knows him all too well.

Too often when LGBT characters appear in movies, there is a separation between having queer characters front and center (visibility) and telling a story authentic to LGBTQ+ identities (relatability). *Resurrections* does both, hammering home the real villain of its story: binary conformity, whether it be with destiny, morality, or gender. Its ragtag team of people "freed from the Matrix" are nearly all explicitly queer, evidenced through lines of dialogue but also with more vibrant wardrobe and bolder gender expression. We see lesbian couples worried about the future, and a gay character casually hit on Neo in passing. These are the people who help both Neo and Trinity find themselves again, but aside from Bugs, they're unfortunately not particularly memorable.

There's an over-reliance on rehashing the original *Matrix* through clips from the film or near-copies of its major set pieces—although *déjà vu* is a major theme of this movie, one wishes it was taken a step beyond a mere revisiting to jog Neo's memory. The narrative hoops explaining the return and recast of Morpheus (Yahya Abdul-Mateen II) are also a bit high to jump through, and some of his lines are laugh-out-loud awkward, as opposed to Laurence Fishburne's conviction and gravitas in the original trilogy. This is the flipside of the "meta" moments in *Resurrections*: the writing can get self-aware to the point of indulgence, like a college student fresh out of a postmodernity & philosophy class. An example of this is a game-development meeting scene with Thomas that's clearly talking about making a new *Matrix* movie to make more money, but also the importance of having a groundbreaking message that "speaks to the fans." It's important to note that the people who actually look up to Thomas (and Tiffany) encourage them to evolve and grow, where the people who claim to be their "biggest fans" are still plugged

Ultimately, *The Matrix Resurrections* is a sci-fi romance about missed connection and breaking free of barriers to living one's authentic self: whether they be repressed traumatic experiences, stifling people or situations, or our shadow-self sabotaging our potential for healing and constructive change. If the queer stories of its "away team" were given more substance in place of meta-dialogue, it could be an even more powerful statement of queer sci-fi film.

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

To paraphrase Bette Davis in *All About Eve*, "Fasten your seatbelt, it's going to be a thrilling read!" When a former President takes to writing a mystery thriller with one of the genre's best-selling authors, the reader can expect an inside account, even if it's fictional, into the cut-throat world of Washington politics.



As I read this well-crafted story, I kept trying to figure out which man wrote which parts of the book. I don't know if the two got together and wrote simultaneously or if they exchanged ideas via Zoom or some other mode of communication. Needless to say, the plot involves around an international terrorist named Suliman Cindoruk. His aim is to destroy the United States but not via warfare weapons. His scheme is well financed, and he employs the best minds he can find in the world of cyber crimes.

President Jon Duncan faces imminent impeachment by the House of Representatives and being found guilty in the trial by the Senate for his allowing Cindoruk to escape from capture in Algeria. Both the House and the Senate hold strong majorities by the opposing party of the President. Duncan agrees to allow himself to be interrogated by the Speaker of the House, Lester Rhodes, who is an especially disagreeable man intent on topping Duncan's administration and having Vice President Kathy Brandt take the reins of government. Brandt took an early lead in the primary elections until Duncan entered the race. An Iraq War hero, Duncan went on to win the nomination and chose Brandt as his Vice President. Was that a wise decision?

Duncan, a widower in his mid 50s, suffers from a rare blood disorder and is ordered by his doctor to take time off to rest and recuperate. Presidents just can not do that he explains to her. His rare condition could stop his Presidency in its tracks.

Enter Nina, a young woman formerly in the employ of the Sons of Jihad, a rogue organization headed by Cindoruk. She is one half of a duo who has information that can bring the United States to its knees. Her counterpart is a young man named Augie. Both he and she have vital information, but what one has is no good unless the other can employ what he/she knows. They carry this information only in their heads with no paper trail.

Duncan agrees to meet Augie at a baseball game in order to convince the young man to come to America's rescue. At the baseball game, all hell breaks loose when an electrical blackout plunges all concerned into darkness. Bullets fly, vehicles get destroyed in the chaos, and the President goes missing.

Clinton and Patterson plant plenty of red herrings in the story when the Prime Minister of Israel, the German Chancellor, and the Russian Prime Minister all descend on a secret meeting place in rural Virginia, complete with blackout trappings where information cannot be hacked. There's lots of murder and mayhem, tense moments with timetables playing a vital part, and treachery at every turn.

It's a very readable and exciting book.
